Agency, Consent, and Coercion: Young People's Experiences of First Sex in Ashanti and Northern Regions, Ghana (QRS24)

An Analysis Brief from The DHS Program

Why study the relationship context of young people's first sex?

Despite increased attention on adolescent health programming, little is known about the context of young people's first sexual experience. The types of relationships that young women and men have, how they discuss sex, and if coercion appears in relationships are essential factors in young people's decision about if and when to become sexually active, the experience of first sex, and the meaning it has for their lives. This qualitative study examines these themes through interviews of young people in the Ashanti and Northern Regions of Ghana.

What are the key results?

The majority of young people first have sex in established relationships. Among the 114 young women and 40 young men interviewed for this study, about four in five respondents had their first sexual experience within an established, intimate relationship. The remaining respondents first had sex with someone they were not in a relationship with at the time. All respondents from the Ashanti Region and all young men from the Northern Region first had sex before marriage, while over half of young women from the Northern Region were married at the time

they first had sex. This means that all married respondents were young women from the Northern Region.

The discussion of sex prior to the time of first sex depends on the relationship type. People in established relationships would generally discuss sex beforehand and men often initiated the discussion. For those who did not communicate about sex prior to the time of sex, many began discussing sex afterwards. However, for respondents whose first sex was with a non-partner, there was often no discussion about sex at all, either before or after sex.

Interviewer (I): Did you talk about sex?

Respondent (R): The man can talk about it, but lady will not if she wise. But if it is someone who is not wise, they will have sex when they are still in a relationship.

I: So did he talk to you about sex?

R: Yes.

I: After the first time you had sex with him, did he talk about it again?

R: Yes after the first time, you know he is now my husband.

Couples generally had more open communication about sex and family planning after first sex.

While communication about sex was often limited before first sex, many respondents reported higher levels of communication about sex and family planning in their relationships afterwards.

Young people discuss sex with peers around the time of first sex. Both young men and women generally talked with their peers about sex before first sex, though the types of conversations were very different for women and men. Women reported much more general conversations with their peers, while men were more likely to talk about their own personal experiences.

Interviewer (I): Okay, around the first time you had sex, did you talk about sex with your friends, like either in general or your experiences?

Respondent (R): In general.

I: Hmm, you spoke about sex with them.

R: In general but not myself, I did this, I did that.

I: So what do you think your close friends were doing? Were they also having sex or saying they had sex?

R: I am sure they were because their responses showed me that they were.

I: So how much of your sexual experience did you share with your friends?

R: I do not really share my sexual experience with my friends because they are also mature and they understand.

Interviewer (I): How much of your first sexual experience did you share with your friends?

Respondent (R): [Laughs] the experience I had from it?

I: Yes or what happened how much of it did you tell your friends?

R: I use to tell them.

I: The first one that happened, first time?

R: You see that I had not done that before so when I did it I told them.
